Designated "The Best Minor League Ballpark in America" by *Baseball America* in 1999, Victory Field is a summer-time favorite for all. The Indianapolis Zoo is the nation's only accredited combined zoo, aquarium and botanical garden.

The Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art is one of only two museums east of the Mississippi that showcases Native-American and Western art. In 2005 the Eiteljorg added an education center, café, galleries devoted to Western and Native American contemporary art and beautiful gardens along the Downtown Central Canal.

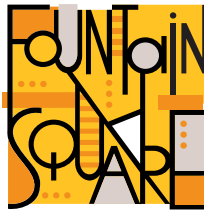

The Indiana State Museum is the crossroads of everything interesting,
